### Altercation

**Example** A loud altercation broke out in the street.

Mnemonic Altercation = Alter (change) + Situation =

**Antonyms** Agreement, Harmony



### Altruism

Noun



**Meaning** Selfless concern for the well-being of others

**Example** Her life was devoted to altruism and charity.

**Sentence** Acts of altruism are vital for a

compassionate society.

**Mnemonic** Altruism = All true giving

**Synonyms** Selflessness, Kindness

**Antonyms** Selfishness, Greed



# Amalgamate

/əˈmæl.gə.meɪt/

Verb



**Meaning** To combine or unite to form one entity

**Example** The two firms amalgamated into a larger

company.

**Sentence** They decided to amalgamate their efforts for

a greater cause.

**Mnemonic** Amalgamate = A mall gate merges shops

**Synonyms** Merge, Combine

**Antonyms** Separate, Split



### Ambidextrous

**Meaning** Able to use both hands equally well

**Example** He's ambidextrous and can write with both

hands.

**Sentence** Few people are truly ambidextrous.

**Mnemonic** Ambidextrous = Both dexterous hands

**Synonyms** Versatile, Two-handed

**Antonyms** Clumsy, Unhanded



# Ambiguous

**Meaning** Open to more than one interpretation;

unclear

**Example** His ambiguous answer confused the

audience.

**Sentence** The ending of the movie was ambiguous.

**Mnemonic** Ambiguous = A big guess needed

Synonyms Vague, Unclear

**Antonyms** Clear, Definite



#### Ambivalence

Noun



**Meaning** The state of having mixed feelings or

contradictory ideas

**Example** She felt ambivalence about leaving her

hometown.

**Sentence** His ambivalence was evident in his

indecision.

Mnemonic Ambivalence = Both feelings at once

**Synonyms** Uncertainty, Conflict

**Antonyms** Certainty, Resolution

**Meaning** Having mixed feelings or contradictory ideas

**Example** He was ambivalent about accepting the

promotion.

**Sentence** Her ambivalent attitude puzzled her friends.

**Antonyms** Decisive, Sure



## Amble

**Meaning** To walk slowly and casually

**Synonyms** Stroll, Saunter

**Antonyms** Rush, Sprint



# Ambulatory

**Meaning** Able to walk; relating to or adapted for

walking

**Example** After surgery, he became ambulatory within

a week.

**Sentence** The hospital's ambulatory services help

patients who can walk.

**Mnemonic** Ambulatory = Ambulate = Move around

**Synonyms** Mobile, Walking

**Antonyms** Bedridden, Immobile



### Ameliorate

Verb



**Meaning** To make something bad or unsatisfactory

better

**Example** Steps were taken to ameliorate living

conditions.

**Sentence** His apology ameliorated the tense situation.

**Mnemonic** Ameliorate = Make "a million" times better

**Synonyms** Improve, Enhance

**Antonyms** Worsen, Deteriorate



### Amenable

/ə'miː.nə.bəl/



**Meaning** Open and responsive to suggestion; easily

persuaded or controlled

**Example** She was amenable to the idea of moving

abroad.

**Sentence** The manager was amenable to feedback.

**Mnemonic** Amenable = Amen + Able to agree

**Synonyms** Agreeable, Cooperative

**Antonyms** Stubborn, Inflexible



### Amend

/ə'mend/

Verb



**Meaning** To make changes to improve or correct

something

**Example** The constitution was amended to protect

civil rights.

**Sentence** He amended his statement after realizing

the mistake.

**Mnemonic** Amend = A mend = To fix or correct

**Synonyms** Revise, Improve

**Antonyms** Damage, Worsen



# Amenity

Noun



**Meaning** A desirable or useful feature or facility

**Example** The hotel offers great amenities such as a

gym and spa.

**Sentence** Parks and libraries are important public

amenities.

**Mnemonic** Amenity = A mini luxury

**Synonyms** Facility, Comfort

**Antonyms** Inconvenience, Discomfort



## Amiable

**Meaning** Having a friendly and pleasant manner

**Example** He is an amiable host who makes guests feel

welcome.

**Sentence** Her amiable smile charmed everyone she

met.

**Mnemonic** Amiable = A "me-able" — easy to be with

**Synonyms** Friendly, Pleasant

**Antonyms** Hostile, Unfriendly



### Amicable

**Meaning** Characterized by friendliness and absence

of discord

**Example** They reached an amicable settlement in

court.

**Sentence** Their breakup was surprisingly amicable.

**Mnemonic** Amicable = Amigo + Cable — friendly

connection

**Synonyms** Friendly, Peaceable

**Antonyms** Hostile, Antagonistic



# Amity

Noun



**Meaning** A friendly relationship

**Example** The treaty restored amity between the

nations.

**Sentence** Their amity lasted throughout their lives.

**Mnemonic** Amity = Amigo + Unity

**Synonyms** Friendship, Harmony

**Antonyms** Hostility, Animosity



### Amnesty

/ˈæm.nə.sti/

Noun



**Meaning** A general pardon for offenses, especially

political ones

**Example** The government granted amnesty to

political prisoners.

**Sentence** He was released under a general amnesty.

**Mnemonic** Amnesty = Amnesia about past crimes

**Synonyms** Pardon, Forgiveness

**Antonyms** Punishment, Penalty



# Amorphous

Adjective



**Meaning** Without a clearly defined shape or form

**Example** The cloud had an amorphous shape.

**Sentence** Their ideas were still amorphous and

unorganized.

**Mnemonic** Amorphous = A + Morph = No shape

**Synonyms** Shapeless, Formless

**Antonyms** Structured, Definite



## Ampere

Noun



**Meaning** The basic unit of electric current in the

International System of Units (SI)

**Example** The bulb requires two amperes to operate.

**Sentence** The engineer measured the current in

amperes.

**Mnemonic** Ampere = Amp for electric current

**Synonyms** Unit of current

# Amphibian

Noun



**Meaning** An animal that can live both on land and in

water

**Example** A frog is a common amphibian.

**Sentence** Amphibians like salamanders thrive in moist

environments.

Mnemonic Amphibian = Amphibious = Both land and

water

**Synonyms** Dual-living animal

**Antonyms** Land-only/Sea-only creatures



# Ample

Adjective



**Meaning** More than enough; abundant

**Example** There was ample food for everyone at the

feast.

**Sentence** He left ample space between the tables.

**Mnemonic** Ample = Example = Plenty

Synonyms Abundant, Plentiful

**Antonyms** Meager, Insufficient



## Amplify

/ˈæm.plɪ.faɪ/

Verb



**Meaning** To increase in size, strength, or intensity

**Example** Speakers amplify the sound of the music.

**Sentence** His actions amplified the crisis instead of

calming it.

**Mnemonic** Amplify = Amp up the sound

**Synonyms** Increase, Boost

**Antonyms** Diminish, Reduce



## Amputate

/ˈæm.pjʊ.teɪt/

Verb



**Meaning** To cut off a limb or part of the body

**Example** The surgeon had to amputate his leg to save

his life.

**Sentence** Severe frostbite forced doctors to amputate

his fingers.

Mnemonic Amputate = Cut away

**Synonyms** Sever, Remove

**Antonyms** Attach, Mend



#### Amuse

/əˈmjuːz/

Verb



**Meaning** To entertain or make someone laugh

**Example** The clown amused the children with his

tricks.

**Sentence** He amused himself by watching comedy

shows.

**Mnemonic** Amuse = A muse = Inspire joy

**Synonyms** Entertain, Delight

**Antonyms** Bore, Depress



#### Anachronism

/əˈnæk.rə.nɪ.zəm/

Noun



**Meaning** Something out of place in time

**Example** The movie showed a car in ancient Rome, a

clear anachronism.

**Sentence** His use of a typewriter today is an

anachronism.

**Mnemonic** Anachronism = Ana (against) + Chronos

(time)

**Synonyms** Misplacement, Outdated item

**Antonyms** Timely object



### Anachronistic

Adjective



**Meaning** Belonging to a period other than the present

**Example** His anachronistic views made him seem old-

fashioned.

**Sentence** Wearing armor to work would be

anachronistic today.

**Mnemonic** Anachronistic = Against chronological order

**Synonyms** Outdated, Old-fashioned

**Antonyms** Modern, Contemporary



## Analgesic

Noun/Adjective



**Meaning** A medicine or substance that relieves pain

**Example** He took an analgesic for his back pain.

**Sentence** Analgesic drugs are essential in post-surgical

care.

**Mnemonic** Analgesic = "Anti-pain" remedy

**Synonyms** Painkiller, Anesthetic

**Antonyms** Pain-inducing agent



# Analogous

/əˈnæl.ə.gəs/

Adjective



**Meaning** Comparable in certain respects

**Example** The wings of bats and birds are analogous

structures.

**Sentence** Their situation is analogous to ours.

**Mnemonic** Analogous = Analogy-like, comparable

**Synonyms** Similar, Comparable

**Antonyms** Different, Unrelated



## Anarchy

/ˈæn.ə.ki/

Noun



**Meaning** Absence of government and order

**Example** The country descended into anarchy after

the revolution.

**Sentence** Without rules, the classroom slipped into

anarchy.

**Mnemonic** Anarchy = No hierarchy

**Synonyms** Chaos, Lawlessness

**Antonyms** Order, Government
