**Meaning** Relating to ancestors or heritage

**Example** They live on their ancestral land.

**Synonyms** Inherited, Traditional

**Antonyms** Modern, New



## Ancestry

Noun



**Meaning** One's family or ethnic descent

**Example** His ancestry can be traced back to medieval

kings.

**Sentence** DNA tests reveal a person's ancestry.

## Anchor

**Meaning** A heavy object to keep something in place;

to secure firmly

**Example** The ship dropped anchor near the shore.

**Sentence** Education served as an anchor in his life.

**Mnemonic** Anchor = Fix firmly

**Synonyms** Support, Secure

**Antonyms** Release, Unfasten



## Ancillary

Adjective/Noun



**Meaning** Providing support to the primary activities

or operation

**Example** The hospital has an ancillary lab service.

**Sentence** Ancillary staff assist doctors in hospitals.

**Mnemonic** Ancillary = Aid + Necessary

**Synonyms** Supplementary, Supportive

**Antonyms** Main, Principal



# Androgynous

Adjective



**Meaning** Having both male and female characteristics

**Example** The fashion line featured androgynous

designs.

**Sentence** The performer had an androgynous

appearance.

**Mnemonic** Androgynous = Andro (man) + Gynous

(woman) = both traits

**Synonyms** Gender-neutral, Unisex

**Antonyms** Gender-specific



### Anecdotal

Adjective



**Meaning** Based on personal accounts rather than

facts or research

**Example** The evidence was largely anecdotal.

**Sentence** She shared anecdotal stories during the

lecture.

Mnemonic Anecdotal = Anecdotes instead of data

**Synonyms** Personal, Informal

**Antonyms** Scientific, Systematic



## Anecdote

**Meaning** A short, amusing or interesting story about a

real incident or person

**Example** He told a funny anecdote about his

childhood.

**Sentence** The speaker began with a humorous

anecdote.

**Mnemonic** Anecdote = A neat note (story)

**Synonyms** Story, Tale

**Antonyms** Lecture, Dissertation



## Anemia

Noun



**Meaning** A condition in which the blood lacks enough

healthy red cells

**Example** She was diagnosed with anemia after feeling

weak.

**Sentence** Iron supplements are often used to treat

anemia.

**Mnemonic** Anemia = Lack of blood energy

**Synonyms** Blood deficiency, Weakness

**Antonyms** Robustness, Strength



## Anesthetic

Noun/Adjective



**Meaning** A drug that causes loss of sensation

**Example** The patient was given a local anesthetic.

**Sentence** General anesthetic is used for major

surgeries.

**Mnemonic** Anesthetic = Anti-sensation

**Synonyms** Painkiller, Numbing agent

**Antonyms** Sensitizer, Stimulant



# Angst

/æŋst/

Noun



**Meaning** A deep anxiety or dread, typically an

unfocused one

**Example** She felt angst about her career choices.

**Sentence** Many teens experience angst during

adolescence.

**Mnemonic** Angst = Anxiety ghost

**Synonyms** Anxiety, Dread

**Antonyms** Calm, Confidence



# Anguish

/ˈæŋ.gwɪʃ/

Noun/Verb



**Meaning** Severe mental or physical pain or suffering

**Example** The anguish of losing her child was

unbearable.

**Sentence** His anguished cries echoed in the room.

**Mnemonic** Anguish = Angry pain

**Synonyms** Suffering, Distress

**Antonyms** Comfort, Relief



# Angular

Adjective



**Meaning** Having angles or sharp corners; lean and

bony

**Example** His angular face made him look striking.

**Sentence** Modern architecture often has angular

designs.

Mnemonic Angular = Angle + Sharp

**Synonyms** Pointed, Sharp

Antonyms Rounded, Smooth



## Animosity

Noun



**Meaning** Strong hostility or active hatred

**Example** There was animosity between the rival

teams.

**Sentence** He harbored animosity toward his former

boss.

**Mnemonic** Animosity = Animal hostility

**Synonyms** Hatred, Hostility

**Antonyms** Friendship, Goodwill

**Meaning** To add or attach, especially territory; an

addition

**Example** The country annexed the neighboring land.

**Sentence** The school added an annex for science labs.

**Mnemonic** Annex = Add next

**Synonyms** Add, Append

## Annihilate

**Meaning** To destroy completely

**Example** The bomb annihilated the entire city block.

**Meaning** To make a public declaration or statement

**Example** She announced her resignation yesterday.

**Mnemonic** Announce = Announce loudly

**Synonyms** Declare, Proclaim

**Antonyms** Conceal, Hide



### Annoy

Verb



**Meaning** To irritate or disturb someone

**Example** His constant tapping annoyed everyone.

**Sentence** Noisy neighbors often annoy the residents.

**Mnemonic** Annoy = A noise that irritates

**Synonyms** Irritate, Bother

**Antonyms** Please, Soothe



## Annul

**Meaning** To declare invalid; to cancel officially

**Example** The court annulled the unfair contract.

**Sentence** They annulled their marriage after a year.

**Mnemonic** Annul = Nullify

**Synonyms** Cancel, Invalidate

**Antonyms** Confirm, Approve



# Anodyne

**Meaning** Something that soothes or relieves pain;

inoffensive

**Example** The conversation remained anodyne to

avoid conflict.

**Sentence** The doctor prescribed an anodyne for her

**Synonyms** Soothing, Bland

**Antonyms** Harsh, Aggravating



### Anomalous

**Meaning** Deviating from the normal or expected

**Example** His anomalous test results puzzled the

doctors.

**Sentence** Anomalous behavior was noted in the

experiment.

**Mnemonic** Anomalous = Not normal

**Synonyms** Irregular, Unusual

**Antonyms** Normal, Typical



### Anomaly

**Meaning** Something different from the norm; an

irregularity

**Example** There was an anomaly in the data collection.

**Sentence** Snow in summer is an anomaly.

**Mnemonic** Anomaly = A nomad idea

**Synonyms** Abnormality, Irregularity

**Antonyms** Regularity, Normalcy



# Anonymity

**Example** The donor requested complete anonymity.

another

**Example** A bad antecedent can hurt your job

application.

**Sentence** The storm was an antecedent to the flood.

**Mnemonic** Antecedent = Before-seed

**Synonyms** Predecessor, Forerunner

**Antonyms** Modern, Contemporary
