**Meaning** To decorate or add beauty to something

**Example** She adorned the hall with flowers and lights.

**Sentence** The bride adorned herself with traditional

jewelry.

Mnemonic Adorn = Add + Ornament

**Synonyms** Decorate, Beautify

**Antonyms** Disfigure, Deface

## Adroit

/ə'drɔɪt/

Adjective

**Meaning** Clever or skillful in using the hands or mind

**Example** The magician was adroit at sleight of hand

tricks.

**Sentence** She is adroit in handling complex

negotiations.

**Mnemonic** Adroit = A-draw-it = skill with hands

**Synonyms** Skillful, Dexterous

**Antonyms** Clumsy, Inept

## Adulate

Verb

**Meaning** To praise someone excessively or

obsequiously

**Example** The fans adulated the singer after the

concert.

**Sentence** He was adulated by his followers like a god.

**Mnemonic** Adulate = Add + Applaud excessively

**Synonyms** Flatter, Worship

**Antonyms** Criticize, Insult

#### Adulation

Noun

**Meaning** Excessive praise or admiration

**Example** The celebrity enjoyed the constant

adulation.

**Sentence** His speech was met with unnecessary

## Adulterate

Verb

**Meaning** To make something poorer in quality by

adding another substance

**Example** The milk was found to be adulterated with

water.

**Sentence** Don't adulterate truth with lies.

**Mnemonic** Adulterate = Adult + Rate — fake increase in

value

**Synonyms** Contaminate, Degrade

**Antonyms** Purify, Refine

#### Adumbrate

/'æd.^m.breit/

Verb

**Meaning** To foreshadow or suggest partly; to outline

vaguely

**Example** The dark clouds adumbrated the coming

storm.

**Sentence** His speech adumbrated the policy changes

ahead.

**Mnemonic** Adumbrate = A dumb + rate — hint without

full clarity

**Synonyms** Foreshadow, Outline

**Antonyms** Reveal, Illuminate

## Advent

/'æd.vent/

Noun

**Meaning** The arrival or beginning of something

important

**Example** The advent of the internet changed the

world.

**Sentence** With the advent of AI, industries are

transforming.

**Mnemonic** Advent = Arrival event

**Synonyms** Arrival, Emergence

**Antonyms** Departure, End

#### Adventitious

/\_æd.ven'tɪʃ.əs/

Adjective

**Meaning** Happening by chance or accident; not

inherent or natural

**Example** The discovery was purely adventitious.

**Sentence** His success was adventitious rather than

planned.

**Mnemonic** Adventitious = Adventure-ish = unexpected

Synonyms Accidental, Unplanned

**Antonyms** Planned, Intentional

#### Adversarial

Adjective

**Meaning** Involving conflict or opposition

**Example** The debate took on an adversarial tone.

**Sentence** Their relationship had become increasingly

adversarial.

**Mnemonic** Adverse + Trial = Adversarial

**Synonyms** Hostile, Opposing

**Antonyms** Cooperative, Friendly

## Adverse

Adjective

**Meaning** Preventing success or development; harmful

**Example** The project was delayed due to adverse

weather conditions.

**Sentence** He overcame many adverse circumstances

in his career.

**Mnemonic** Adverse = Averse to progress

**Synonyms** Harmful, Unfavorable

**Antonyms** Favorable, Beneficial

# Adversity

Noun

**Meaning** A difficult or unpleasant situation

**Example** She showed courage in the face of adversity.

**Sentence** He rose to success despite great adversity.

**Mnemonic** Adversity = Adverse situation

**Synonyms** Hardship, Misfortune

**Antonyms** Prosperity, Ease

# Advocacy

/'æd.və.kə.si/

Noun

**Meaning** Public support for or recommendation of a

particular cause or policy

**Example** He is known for his advocacy of free speech.

**Sentence** Her advocacy for education reform inspired

many.

**Mnemonic** Advocacy = Voice added to a cause

**Synonyms** Support, Promotion

**Antonyms** Opposition, Criticism

#### Advocate

Verb/Noun

**Meaning** To publicly support a cause or policy (v); a

person who supports (n)

**Example** She advocates for animal rights.

**Sentence** The lawyer was a strong advocate of justice.

**Mnemonic** Advocate = Add voice

**Synonyms** Supporter, Champion

**Antonyms** Opponent, Critic

# Aerie

/ˈεə.ri/

Noun

**Meaning** A nest of a bird of prey; a high, secluded

dwelling

**Example** The eagle built its aerie on the cliff's edge.

**Sentence** The mountain cabin sat like an aerie above

the valley.

**Mnemonic** Aerie = Airy home above the ground

**Synonyms** Nest, Roost

**Antonyms** Ground, Burrow

# Aesthetic

/es'θet.ik/

Adjective

**Meaning** Concerned with beauty or the appreciation

of beauty

**Example** The painting had great aesthetic value.

**Sentence** Her room was decorated with aesthetic

appeal.

**Mnemonic** Aesthetic = Artistic style or beauty

**Synonyms** Artistic, Tasteful

**Antonyms** Unattractive, Unappealing

#### Aestheticism

/es'θet.i.si.zəm/

Noun

**Meaning** Devotion to or emphasis on beauty or

artistic expression

**Example** Aestheticism values art for its beauty rather

than message.

**Sentence** The movement of aestheticism flourished in

19th-century Europe.

**Mnemonic** Aestheticism = Belief in beauty as central

Synonyms Artistic idealism, Beauty-worship

**Antonyms** Utilitarianism, Plainness

## Affable

/ˈæf.ə.bəl/

Adjective

**Meaning** Friendly, good-natured, and easy to talk to

**Example** He had an affable manner that made

everyone comfortable.

**Sentence** The host was affable and greeted everyone

with a smile.

**Mnemonic** Affable = Laughable + Friendly smile

**Synonyms** Friendly, Amiable

**Antonyms** Hostile, Aloof

#### Affectation

/ˌæf.ekˈteɪ.ʃən/

Noun

**Meaning** Behavior or speech that is artificial and

intended to impress others

**Example** His British accent is just an affectation.

**Sentence** She wore pearls as an affectation of upper-

class elegance.

**Mnemonic** Affectation = Fake affection or behavior

**Synonyms** Pretension, Insincerity

**Antonyms** Sincerity, Naturalness

### Affinity

/əˈfɪn.ə.ti/

Noun

**Meaning** A natural liking or attraction to someone or

something

**Example** She has an affinity for classical music.

**Sentence** There's a strong affinity between the two

cultures.

Mnemonic Affinity = You "fit in" naturally

**Synonyms** Attraction, Liking

**Antonyms** Aversion, Dislike

#### Affluent

/'æf.lu.ənt/

Adjective

**Meaning** Wealthy; having a great deal of money or

resources

**Example** They live in an affluent neighborhood.

**Sentence** The country became more affluent after the

oil boom.

**Mnemonic** Affluent = Flow of riches

**Synonyms** Wealthy, Prosperous

**Antonyms** Poor, Needy

## Aggrandize

/əˈgræn.daɪz/

Verb

**Meaning** To increase the power, wealth, or reputation

of someone/something

**Example** He tried to aggrandize himself by

exaggerating his role.

**Sentence** The politician aggrandized his achievements

during the speech.

**Mnemonic** Aggrandize = Add grandness

**Synonyms** Exaggerate, Elevate

**Antonyms** Belittle, Diminish

#### Aggravate

/ˈæg.rə.veɪt/

Verb

**Meaning** To make worse or more severe

**Example** Scratching the rash will only aggravate it.

**Sentence** His rude behavior aggravated the tense

situation.

**Mnemonic** Aggravate = Add gravity to the problem

**Synonyms** Worsen, Intensify

**Antonyms** Alleviate, Improve

#### Aggregate

/'æg.rɪ.gət/

Noun/Adj/Verb

**Meaning** A whole formed by combining several

elements; to collect into one

**Example** The aggregate score of both teams was 5–3.

**Sentence** The data was aggregated from various

sources.

**Mnemonic** Aggregate = All + Great — grouped into one

**Synonyms** Total, Collection

**Antonyms** Individual, Fragment

# Aggrieve

/əˈgriːv/

Verb

**Meaning** To oppress or wrong someone; to cause

distress

**Example** The unjust law aggrieved many citizens.

**Sentence** He felt aggrieved by the manager's decision.

**Mnemonic** Aggrieve = Give grief

**Synonyms** Distress, Wrong

**Antonyms** Soothe, Please

### Aghast

/əˈgɑːst/

Adjective

**Meaning** Filled with shock or horror

**Example** She was aghast at the news of the accident.

**Sentence** The audience stood aghast at the gruesome

scene.

**Mnemonic** Aghast = A ghost — shock or horror

**Synonyms** Shocked, Appalled

Antonyms Unfazed, Calm

## Agile

/ˈædʒ.aɪl/

Adjective

**Meaning** Able to move quickly and easily; mentally

quick and adaptable

**Example** The cat was agile, leaping from roof to roof.

**Sentence** She's agile in solving complex problems.

**Mnemonic** Agile = Add + I move — quick to react

Synonyms Nimble, Flexible

**Antonyms** Slow, Rigid

### Agitate

/ˈædʒ.ɪ.teɪt/

Verb

**Meaning** To stir up or disturb; to cause public concern

or excitement

**Example** The news of the strike agitated the workers.

**Sentence** His speech agitated the crowd, creating a

sense of unrest.

**Mnemonic** Agitate = Add + Motion — cause movement

or change

**Synonyms** Disturb, Stir, Rattle

**Antonyms** Calm, Soothe

#### Agnostic

/æg'nɒs.tɪk/

Noun/Adjective

**Meaning** A person who believes that the existence of

God, the divine, or the supernatural is

unknown or unknowable

**Example** He identifies as agnostic, unsure of religious

beliefs.

**Sentence** Many scientists remain agnostic about the

possibility of extraterrestrial life.

**Mnemonic** A-gnosis = No knowledge

**Synonyms** Skeptic, Uncertain

**Antonyms** Believer, Theist

Agog

/əˈgɒg/

Adjective

**Meaning** Very eager or excited, especially about

something that is going to happen

**Example** The fans were agog to see their favorite band

perform live.

**Sentence** The students were agog with anticipation

before the announcement.

**Mnemonic** Agog = A + Go — excited to go or start

**Synonyms** Eager, Enthusiastic

**Antonyms** Uninterested, Indifferent

## Agonize

/ˈægəˌnaɪz/

Verb

**Meaning** To suffer great physical or mental pain or

anxiety

**Example** He agonized over the decision for days.

**Sentence** She agonized at the thought of losing her

job.

**Mnemonic** Agonize = A + Gasp = intense pain or worry

**Synonyms** Suffer, Worry, Fret

**Antonyms** Relax, Calm
